- Aesop was a storyteller who lived in Ancient Greece.
- It is thought that he never wrote down any of his stories, but rather told them orally. His stories were recorded in written form many years after his death.
- Each story contains a moral message. This story suggests that gentle persuasion can be more powerful than persuasion by force.

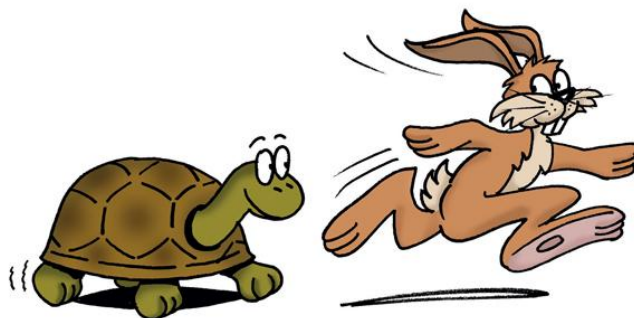
