
Reading:



• 3D shape properties:


Faces - A face is a flat or curved surface on a 3D shape. For example a cube has

6 faces.

Edges - an edge is where two faces meet. For example, a cube has 12 edges.

Vertices / Corners - a vertex is a corner where edges meet. A cube has 8 vertices.







Newgrange and Carrowkeel



Newgrange is an ancient passage tomb that was built over 5,000 years ago. It is in Co. Meath. Newgrange is a circular mound that is surrounded by ninety-seven kerbstones. On the shortest day of the year, known as the winter solstice, the sun shines through the roof-box, down the long passage and into the chamber.

Carrowkeel

Carrowkeel cairns are in Co. Sligo. It is believed that these cairns are older than Newgrange. Some of the cairns are named with letters. Every year the sun shines through the roof-box and into the chamber on the longest day of the year, which is known as the summer solstice.

Cooking with Kids



What you need:

Music: Create the sounds of the ocean using an ocean drum



An ocean drum sounds remarkably like the waves at the seashore.

What you will need:

- A sturdy box: Pizza boxes or flat boxes
- Strong tape: Packing tape, masking tape or electrical tape
- Plastic to cover the window in the box
- Contents for the drum: Choose any small fillings such as pasta, lentils, dried beans, marbles, or small pebbles.

What You Do:

- 1. With the help of an adult, cut a window in the front of your box using scissors.
- 2. Cover the window you have cut out with some plastic and seal the plastic with strong tape.
- 3. Now choose your fillings and fill your ocean drum. Small, round objects give a sound most like a real ocean drum, but you can get creative with what you'd like to use.
- 4. Once you've chosen your perfect contents, you are ready to seal the drum. Cover with strong tape so that when played the contents will stay inside. You can paint your box or decorate the outside of your box.
